The depots cannot be effected until the financial conditions improve. I present a European mechanic at Eldoret and a European mechanic at Mombasa carry out minor repairs in these areas. Native Mechanics are being trained by the Uganda Government as drivers and 112 as mechanic learners. The total mileage of all vehicles in use with the exception of those allotted to Northern Frontier District and myself was during the period April 1920 to March 1921 estimated at 265,482 miles at a running cost of 51.2 cents per mile. Speedometers have now

been attached to all cars and will enable precision in the future calculation of running costs.

7. The expenses of upkeep and the general utility of Ford Cars more especially in outside areas were thoroughly investigated and recommendations were approved by Legislative Council for the replacement of Ford by Dodge Cars. It is anticipated that considerable economy will be effected by the use of a better class of car. Twenty one cars are on order (in this connection please refer to my telegram No. 478 of 3rd November) and on their arrival the surplus Ford cars and spares will be sold off and the sums derived from the sale will be credited to Revenue.

With reference to Viscount Milner's despatch No. 674 of 17th May 1920, in which a report on the working of the Civil Motor Transport scheme was desired with particular reference to its financial effect, I have the honour to refer to my despatch No. 323 of March 31st 1920, in which I intimated the purchase of 83 cars from the Salvage Commission, and the presentation of 6 cars by the Red Cross Society. Since June 1919 16 more vehicles have been purchased and the total fleet of Government vehicles is 22 exclusive of the 21 cars in the possession of the introduction of Daimler.

At the present time the Commission has approved from the Salvage Commission 10 cars from the Commission. These cars are being used for the purpose of the Civil Motor Transport scheme.
