My Lord :-

with reference to my despatch No. 141 of the 1st. instant, I have the honour to inform Your Lordship that I was received in audience by Ras Taffari on Daturday last for a final discussion of the Magi question. Ras kassa and I was accompanied by Major Hawkins. Pitaurari Hapta Giorgis were present.

The Heir apparent on behalf of the byseinian dovernment announced that, in spits of any difficulties resulting to themselves, they had decided to instruct payamatch Desta as I had requested at the previous audience, and that they proposed to send a representative of the Central Government who would be called a Secretar, with Dejamatch Desta to Magi, to ensure that the instructions were carried out and to act as intermediary between Major Mawkins and Dejagmatch Desta if necessary.

The was them asked me if I would undertake, on beh if of my Government, that no taxes would be levied on abgestnian subjects and ac buildings erected on the Judan side of the red line until a freeh delimitation of the frontier had been made jointly by commissioners appointed by our respective Hove rnments.

I regretted that I was unable to give any such undertaking as it was neither in keeping with the terms of the Treaty nor was it necessary, as the sudan Soveymment had no immediate intention of taxing residents living near the border of the sudan territory, and as far as I knew they had no building programme in contemplation.

When I saked the has if the abyesinian Government were prepared to make a similar undertaking as they had spiked of me in respect to the abyesinian side of the frontier the point was not pursued further.

Dejamatch Desta was then called.

Bas Taffari in the name of his Government proceeded to instruct him in respect to the limits of his province as defined by Treaty, and told him that he would be supplied with a map, and an explanatory memorandum detailing the different places on the front or falling in British and Abyseinian territory. (This memorandum was prepared by Major Hawkins from Major Athill's notes written on the spot and was given by me to the Ras.)

The Heir Apparent then warned the Dejamatch as to him behaviour and gave him the most explicit orders that the frontier line was to be respected and that no one single abysemian was to be allowed to cross that frontier on any pretext whatsoever. He then adjured the rejamatch to work with Major Hawkins in the interests of both countries.

He ordered him to build a suitable Consulate for Major Hawkins' use and told him to give him every other assist most in his power.

After I had expressed on tire setisfaction with these instructions

instructions I took the opportunity to remind Dejamatch Desta, and the representatives of the Control Government present, that he had been deteined at Adja Atoms at the express desire of His Majasty's Government, but that now natters had been arranged satisfactorily, it was by the expression of His Majasty's Government that he was returning to Magi, and I expressed confidence in the Dejamatch to work tegether with Major Hawkins for the prosperity of the Magi province.

Thus the matter was settled.

I did not does the moment opportune to pursue the question of a re-delimitation.

In principle the Esca and the Fitaurari scopted a re-delimitation and suggested that we should discuss the project further at a future neeting. In the course of preceeding discussions Fitaurari Hapta florgis baked by has kased had remarked that a re-delimitation by Commissioners appointed by our respective Soverments was obviously necessary; and he empressed naively a hope that His Majes ty's Soverment would then we their way to conceding a certain portion of that country which the Abyssinians had become to regard as belonging to them and which I had now taken away from them.

I seized this opportunity to remind the Central Coverament that they had, so far, not paid any compensation whatevers for Captain Aylmer's murder and other outsees consisted in British territory, and that any compensation as suggested by the Fitzmari was due from and not to the Abyssinian flovermment.

I propose to test with this question more fully in a separate despatch.

Hajor Hamine will be leaving Adia ababa in about ten days time. As I consider it will assist him very comitably to meet and disease frontier nature with Captain Hainens. His Majorty's Consul in Southern Abyesinis, I am asking the Castral Communent to allow him to proceed via Castral. This request will probably be granted.

Asjamatch posts will, in all probability leave Adia Ababa in six weeks' time. This will give Major Hawkins as opportunity to visit the Berms, and will penalt of his arrival at Magi to coincide with that of Dejamatch Desta.

I trust that the solution of the Magi question as detailed in this one my previous despatches will neet with Tour Legislan's approved.

A settlement has been fraught with many difficulties.

The Apprintm Government, for reasons I have explained were relusions to resognize the frontier, or to accept the appointment of a Course or Frontier Agent.

- As Your herestly is aware it was originally intended to demand:
 - i. The instant dismissal of Fitaurari Desta.
 - ii. The official recognition of the Frontiers.
 - iti. The acceptance of a frontier agent.

In view of the circumstances, vis. (1) that we wish to attain to a rectification of the East african Protectorate frontier in order to ensure a workable basis for our own administration and (11) that we have no wish to enforce a demand that must inevitably be met by a refusal, I have judged it wiser to meet the requirements of the situation and at the same time to retain the goodwill of the Abysainian Government, by measures of operation bather than by an imperative demand.

In respect to the recognition of the frontier and the acceptance of Major Hawkins as Consul, the Abysainian Government have acquiesced, but to attempt to achieve the dismissal or even removal of Dejamatch Desta has, I think, been proved an impracticable policy attended by but doubtful advantages.

He now returns to Magi, by our leave, and he does so without may loss according to British prestigs.

On the contrary I am inclined to thick that results will prove that British interests will be best served by him return rather than his dismissal.
