

Mr. Russell, May 2nd, 1941.

I propose in replying to a note which I have just received from Abyssinia, or a pt in which they ask that Gaddadum may be evacuated. The General Officer Commanding Southern Frontier has sent me a copy of the note with authority to reply.

In view of probable action of Abyssinia, all necessary precautions should be taken by the General Officer Commanding Southern Frontier though I do not believe there is any real threat to Gaddadum, although every effort must be made to avoid hostilities.

I am telling (?Gonoul) Southern Frontier to put his leave off for a space and I will let you know when Government.

I am sorry to say
that I have
received from the
Government of Kenya
a telegram to the
effect that they
are unable to accept
the proposal of the
Government of Abyssinia
and they will call upon me to do so. I am
quite willing to do so, and I have informed His Majesty's Government that I have done so.
His Majesty's Government will they propose to do and they can do so
strongly of the opinion that there will be no delay in the
matter of evacuating Gaddisdua when His Majesty's Government find
that there is real improvement in the situation, and are satisfied
that it will endure.

In view of probable arrival of Abyssinian force military
prosecutions should be taken by British authorities at the
frontier though I do not think any attack will be made on
Gaddisdua, although every effort should be made by British forces
to avoid hostilities.

I am telling (Viceroy) Southern Abyssinia that he must
put his leave off for a space and I am informing Kenya
Government.
