ITALIAN EMBASSY.

MEMORANDUM.

By its memorandum dated April 9 last (No. 822), the Italian Embassy stated that it had been reported to the Italian Government that the British authorities in Jubaland, who had in the past allowed the Merahan to move towards the Dura and the Northern Frontier, were now tending to turn this tribe back from the Northern Frontier, from which latter territory the Merahan were entering the territory which forms the object of the negotiations for transfer taking place between the Italian and the British Governments.

By its note of April 28 last (No. 2779), the Foreign Office replied to the Italian Embassy that the locality of the Merahan, properly so-called, was the northern part of Jubaland, i.e., of the territory which may be ceded to Italy.

The Italian Embassy begs to point out further that the country of the Merahan cannot be precisely referred to, since it is known that this tribe (similarly to other tribes of East Africa) has no permanent place of residence, but, in the same way as all pastoral tribes, is nomadic and is constantly moving about to seek for better water and pasture. It is for this reason that, in the strict sense of the word, it does not appear necessary to discuss the question of the territory of the Merahan.

It is, on the other hand, a fact that, since the proposed transfer excludes the Lorian and Waghir zones, which are centres for pasture and watering, it will not be possible for the Italian Government — even admitting that the Merahan

ence practically from the Northern part of Jubaland - to arrange for them to remain within this zone, and that similarly for the same reason as the one which caused them to migrate thereto.

In reality, the majority of these tribes is at present within the territory of the Dawa and of the North Frontier, and it is for this very reason that the Italian Government sees no necessity for them to be unhesitatingly moved further east, since, if they were formerly in the territory referred to above, there is now no reason why they should not move away from it.

The Italian Government is well aware of the fact that the Harshas should not be moved west, in case some might be persecuted, which is a reason exclusive concerning the British authorities; but, for the moment, the latter consider it necessary to take care with regard to the Oromo, the Italian Government pointing out that it is just as expedient that similar steps should be taken with regard to tribes east of the zone present occupied by the Harshas, who, as is well known, do not cherish friendly sentiments towards them.

It is for these reasons that the Italian Government cannot do otherwise than maintain its point of view with regard to this question.
