In spite of the French reminder, I think that we need be in a great hurry. In view of the fact that our relations with France appear at present to be deteriorating state.

The terms of our answer to the question specifically raised in the French Note should follow the general lines of the Memorandum attached to 36732/21. But there is the further question whether we should say anything officially to the Foreign Office as to the advisability of including the Zanzibar question in the event of negotiations ever taking place. This comes with a view to a general "clearing" of the "air". As to this I confess that I feel very uncertain. I indicate around 3 A.M. last minute on 36732/21.

I have the pleasure to refer to your letters A.C.350.O/9/60 of the 6th of December, and A.5113.42/60 of the 22nd of July last, enclosing copies of Notes from the French Ambassador with regard to the alleged violation of French Treaty Rights in the Sultan of Zanzibar's Dominions.

2 For reasons which have been semi-officially explained to the Foreign Office and with which I believe that the Marquess Curzon of Kedleston is in agreement, Mr. Churchill has not thought it necessary to hasten the examination of the arguments contained in French Ambassador's Note of the 12th of July last, nor has he now seen desirous of doing so at present to the French Government.

His Majesty's Government did not assert that by the terms of Article 2 of the Treaty the status of a French subject in Zanzibar was in all respects the same as that of a subject of Zanzibar in France, & merely pointed out that, under Article 2 of the Treaty, ~~Frenchmen~~ in France (just as French in Zanzibar) had the right "en toute liberté entrer, sejourner, commercer et circuler en France, avec leurs marchandises" to this the terms of the Article appear precise and not ~~discussio~~ admit of debate. But in any case His Majesty's Government could not admit the argument that, on account of a capitulation imposed on a semi-barbaric and inferior Moslem Potentate 80 years ago, French citizens should escape contribution to the administration of an ordered Government under the British flag.
