I have laid before the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury Sir H. Read's letter of the 2nd instant (25311/1921) relative to the appointment of Mr. R. B. Montgomery as Veterinary Adviser for Uganda, Kenya and Tanganyika, at a salary of £1000 per annum plus 2500 per cent allowance, as from the 1st July next.

In reply I had to request you to convey to the Secretary of State for the Colonies Their Lordships' sanction, as far as Uganda and Tanganyika are concerned, for the payment by each of these dependencies of one-third of Mr. Montgomery's salary and incidental expenses connected with his appointment.

This sanction is given subject to the condition that the methods by which it is proposed to arrive at the total award of pension would be submitted to Their Lordships for their prior concurrence.

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Sir,

I am etc., to acknowledge the receipt of your letter (S.10245) of the 27th of June, relative to the appointment of Mr. R. E. Montgomery as Veterinary Adviser for Uganda, Kenya, and the Tanganyika Territory, at a salary of £1,000 p.a. with a personal allowance of £500 p.a.

2. Mr. Churchill is glad to learn that the L.C. approve the proposal; but for financial reasons he regrets that he cannot proceed with the appointment until he has had an opportunity of discussing the matter further with the Governor of Kenya, who is expected to arrive in this country in a few weeks.

3. In the ^{circumstances} ~~circumstances~~ he has informed the C.A.G. of Uganda that for the present Mr. Montgomery's appointment as Veterinary Adviser to that Government will be continued, and he trusts that ~~the Government will not withdraw their approval of this arrangement.~~

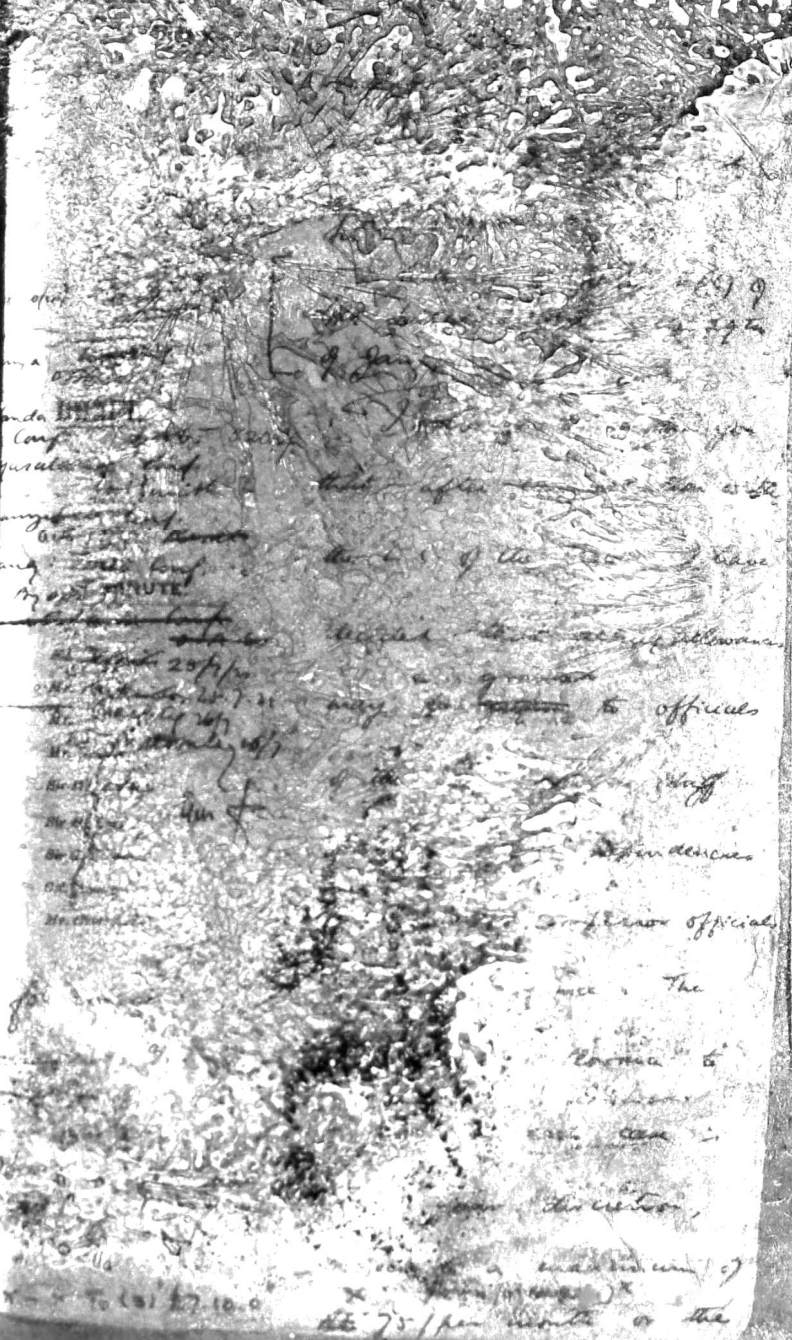
