Telegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor of Kenya. (Sent 1.10 p.m 7th October, 1921)

Priority A. 7th October.

Colonial Office letter to you 8th September specific loan ordinance desirable that ordinance should be passed immediately on meeting of Legislative Council though impossible to say at present when loan will be issued possibly about 24th October. Preamble words "the Colony of" should be inserted before "Kenya". Section (3) some difficulty felt whether when items are only partially provided for unspent moneys can strictly be regarded as savings. From this point of view there would be much advantage in substituting for words "savings in respect of" words "money not spent upon". If matter explained to Legislative Council they will no doubt agree to this substitution. Schedule should be as follows:-

- (1) Kilindini Harbour Works £1,140,000
- (2) Usin Gishu Railway £1,456,000
- (3) Repayment to His Majesty's Treasury of loans already made for development purposes £1,004,000.
- (4) Repayment to revenue of advances made from revenue for military expenditure in connection with the war and for purchase of reserve stores for railway and steamer services £500,000.
- (5) Payment of interest £450,000
- (6) Expenses of issue and deduction for discount £36,000

Total £5,000,000 ends. Sum inserted for Kilindini includes cost of supervision railway connection and certain additional items decided upon since contract made. As probably impossible to arrive at decision as to services to which total loan sanctioned shall be devoted before present loan issued it appears desirable to insert whole estimated cost of Kilindini in present

services agreed upon under powers of vicarage conferred on Government by Section 3 of ordinance enacted as proposed above. Telegraph as soon as Ordinance passed.

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ESTIMATES 1922.

I regret exceedingly that it has not been possible to get detailed estimates for 1922 ready before your departure for England. I attach Statements of rough figures. Statement A shows the estimated financial position on the 31st of December 1921, with a Statement attached to it detailing the excesses and deficits on the Revenue for the current 9 months. The charge under Stamp Duties is due to revision of prices of faxes. Income Tax is a hazard, no figures are yet available for forming an accurate estimate, but the original figure seems to have been too high. School Fees have been reduced, Railway contribution is not near decision but is likely to be exceeded in increased charges by the Railway for carriage of Government goods and passengers. Forest Department was over-estimated. The savings on 1921 expenditure amount to the sum provided for increased Emoluments. There are several other items of expenditure in 1921 not provided for, chief of which is £50,000 interest on overdraft. It is hoped that these may be covered by General Savings and retrenchments. The figures in the Statement of estimated Assets and Liabilities relating to 1920-1921 were detailed in a Statement sent with a recent despatch to the Secretary of State. It will be noted that the deficit on the 31st of ^{December?} March 1921, is estimated to amount to £635,857.

2. Statements B and C give the estimated totals of Revenue and Expenditure under Heads for 1922. The 1921 figures for 12 months are inserted for purposes of

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of comparison but do not agree with the figures in the printed estimates for 1921, which were for 9 months only, nor with those figures with one-third added because in some cases, such as Income and Hut Tax, the 1921 figures were for a whole year and one-third has not been added there for purposes of comparison. House Allowances also have all been taken out of the 1921 Estimates of expenditure under different departmental heads in these statements and shown under Public Works Recurrent. Brief explanations of increases or decreases are given. About £150,000 can be added to the Revenue if the Customs Duties can be raised according to the proposals of the Commissioner of Customs. The expenditure figures as those arrived at after your discussing them with heads of departments and effecting reductions. The more important alterations from the 1921 establishment are as follows:-

Head VI. Administration. No provision for Jubaland. N.F.D. vote curtailed by £35,878 on account of K.A.H. taking over. Increase of Clerical Staff in Native Affairs Department £1,746 to extend registration of natives. Posts of Senior Inspector of Labour and 2 Labour Officers temporarily suspended.

Head VII. Treasury. New post of Assistant Treasurer and alteration of Income Tax Department to Revenue Department to secure more systematic collection of taxes from Non Natives.

Head VIII. Customs. Posts of 2 Preventive Officers retrenched.

Head XII. Police. Staff reduced on account of Jubaland 1 Superintendent, 5 Sergeants (African), 7 Corporals, 101 Constables. Further retrenchments - Inspector General

Inspectors, 9 European Constables, 1 Sub-Inspector
(Indian) 6 Sergeants (African), 7 Corporals, 65 Constables.
Head XIV. Medical. Posts temporarily suspended - 7
fourth grade clerks, 1 Nursing Orderly, 3 Assistant Sur-
geons, 10 Sub-Assistant Surgeons, 2 Sanitation Officers,
3 Senior Medical Officers of Health.

Head XVI. Education. Posts temporarily suspended -
European Education 1 Headmaster, 1 Headmistress, 1 Matron
for Trans-Nzoia School for the erection of which no funds
are immediately available. Native Education 1 Head-
master for Mombasa School of which a Technical Instructor
will be put in charge. New posts - 6 Assistant Teachers
for Indian School Mombasa, 2 Inspectors (£500 - £600
for Native Education, the latter out of the amount set
aside from increased Hut and Poll Tax.

Head XVII. Post Office and Telegraphs. Posts suspended -
10 Postal Clerks and Telegraphists, 3 Engineering
Assistants. New posts- additional Assistant Telegraph
Engineer, 3 second class Telegraph Inspectors to take
the place of the Engineering Assistants retrenched.

Head XI. Agricultural Department. Posts temporarily
suspended - Allowance to Tobacco Officer, Dairy and
Pig Officer, Allowance to Poultry Officer, Horticul-
turalist, Grader and Inspector (for maize), Chief of
Division of Tropical Agriculture, Tropical Agricultura-
list, Foreman Instructor, Chief of Botanical Division,
Entomologist, Experimentalist, Foreman Kibaret Farm
3 Veterinary Officers.

Head XIII. Game. Post of Senior Assistant temporarily
suspended. Two Game Wardens posts would not have been
filled but leave due to retiring Officers necessitates

General, Staff Officer 2 Inspectors, 2 Assistant Inspectors, 9 European Constables, 1 Sub-Inspector (Indian) 6 Sergeants (African), 7 Corporals, 65 Constables.
Head XIV. Medical. Posts temporarily suspended - 7 fourth grade clerks, 1 Nursing Orderly, 3 Assistant Surgeons, 10 Sub-Assistant Surgeons, 2 Sanitation Officers, 3 Senior Medical Officers of Health.

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Head XIX. Post Office and Telegraphs. Posts suspended - 10 Postal Clerks and Telegraphists, 3 Engineering Assistants. New posts- additional Assistant Telegraph Engineer, 3 second class Telegraph Inspectors to take the place of the Engineering Assistants retrenched.

Head XX. Agricultural Department. Posts temporarily suspended - Allowance to Tobacco Officer, Dairy and Pig Officer, Allowance to Poultry Officer, Horticulturalist, Grader and Inspector (for maize), Chief of Division of Tropical Agriculture, Tropical Agriculturalist, Foreman Instructor, Chief of Botanical Division, Entomologist, Experimentalist, Foreman Elmeret Farm, 3 Veterinary Officers.

Head XIII. Game. Post of Senior Assistant temporarily suspended. Two Game Wardens posts would not have been filled but leave due to retiring Officers necessitates provision

provision for their pay for 1922.

Head XXIII. Land Department. Posts suspended - Examiner of Titles, Geologist, £1,273 required for temporary staff to bring work up to date.

Head XXIV. Public Works Department. No provision for carrying out recommendations of Commission. Posts abolished - Assistant Electrical Engineer, Mechanical Transport Officer, Assistant Animal Transport Officer. Provision for Coast Agency re-inserted.

Head XXVI. Public Works Extraordinary. consists of £3,300 for instalment to Military Salvage for buildings taken over after the War, £18,700 for Minor and Petty Works, £10,000 for New Roads and Bridges.

Head XXVII. Interest £72,000 is calculated at 6% on £1,200,000 the estimated average overdraft for the year. This can be reduced if the Railway pay for that part which is due to large balances of stores, or the Imperial Government repay any part of Protectorate Share of War Expenses. About £220,000 of the expenditure is the

local allowance of 50% of Salaries of Europeans. The total Revenue amounts to £1,718,507 and the Expenditure to £2,138,953 a difference of £419,446.

The printed draft Estimates with full explanations will be forwarded to the Secretary of State by next mail .
