Indian Congress and the Arab Community the suggestion that ^{read} inability to write and speak one of the recognized languages in common use in the Colony should be a disqualification was put forward for their consideration. A survey being made as to whether this proposal would allow a wide franchise to the Communities. Executive Council in favour of universal suffrage for Indians and Arabs. Amendments and resolutions above mentioned were referred to the Indian Congress who desire to postpone the introduction of the Bill until the Session of the Legislative Council to allow of wider consideration of their Congress which meets in December. I have informed them it is essential to introduce the Bill this session to enable the election to be held February when the term of the present Council expires and I asked them to call special session of the Congress and submit recommendations at the earliest. Comments by the Indian Congress as soon as they are ready and of the Arab Community which are expected at early date will be telegraphed earliest.
