My Lord Duke,

I have the honour to transmit herewith a form of particulars required for the computation of pension payable to Mr. B. R. de Souza, 2nd Grade Clerk, Public Works Department, who has been pronounced unfit for further service in this Colony by a Medical Board held on him at Nairobi on the 25th May, 1923. A copy of the Proceedings of this Board is enclosed for Your Grace's information.

2. Mr. de Souza's services date from the 10th September, 1909, and he is, therefore, eligible for a pension in respect of thirteen completed years. The pension is computed at Shs. 1,245-20 a year with effect from the 4th November, 1923, inclusive.

3. Pending the receipt of Your Grace's sanction to the pension recommended, I have authorised the payment to Mr. de Souza of an interim allowance of the sum of Shs. 150/- a year with effect from the date aforesaid.

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My Lord Duke,

Reference is made to the message to the Secretary of State
 telegram No. 255 of the 10th of November, 1953, in which the
 Honourable Secretary of State is asked to advise the
 General Manager of the Kenya Railway Company on the
 map outlining the proposed projects of railway
 extensions which should be undertaken
 in the interior of Kenya and Port development.
 It is of course expected that financial assistance
 should be available for these enterprises from
 Imperial Funds and that the Railway Administration
 should not be called upon to meet full interest and
 sinking fund charges during the initial stages.

2. The relaying programme is complicated
 on the understanding that it is desired to place an
 order at a date as possible order for material in
 the United Kingdom - otherwise these orders would
 come on the market gradually as funds were obtained
 and revenue for the purpose. In this regard
 reference is made to Kenya despatch No. 33 of the
 2nd of March and subsequent correspondence on
 same subject.

3. Your Grace will observe that the suggestion has been made by the General Manager that the cost of the Tanka-Bwari and Kitale branches should be transferred to this new loan instead of being met as proposed from the £3,000,000 Loan, when floated. The arguments put forward by the General Manager in support of his suggestion are set out in the enclosed extract of a memorandum submitted by him.

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4. Your Grace has been advised in Kenya despatch No.1623 of the 29th October of this Government's desire to extend the Plateau Line to the Uganda frontier provided that money therefor was forthcoming. It is perhaps unnecessary to reiterate the arguments put forward by Sir Geoffrey Archer as well as by the General Manager in the memorandum annexed to the despatch last year, but it may be pointed out that both Administrations are entirely in accord as to the urgent necessity for the extension of the Plateau Line up to and beyond the Uganda border. A reconnaissance of the proposed route from Turbo to Tororo has already been made by the Chief Engineer, Construction and Survey of Railways, and a copy will be sent to Your Grace with the General Manager's comments at an early date. For the reasons given by the General Manager for Branches to Kuni and Yala are also advocated.

5. The Selat branch is strongly advocated as an important link in the main line as well as an incentive to rubber and coffee cultivation. The Government has been prepared to contribute some outlays of funds towards the construction hitherto.

6. The Government of Uganda, through the
 Contractor, was requested to provide a
 report detailing the progress of the work
 supported by the Government. It was
 taken by Government officials that the
 extent of interest in the project was
 of great importance. It was noted that
 the railway construction programme was
 accelerated would result in a considerable

2. The General Manager of the Railway deals with the question of the payment of interest in paragraph 3 of the Memorandum attached as enclosure in paragraph 2 item 1 of mya of the 16th of November. In your Grace with regard to the Railway allocated Stores in connection with the financial position of the respect of the second point raised by the General Manager relating to the payment of interest on loans, it is hoped that a solution has been reached which will be satisfactory to your Grace in due course. There is no doubt that the Railway will be unable to meet its charges - always supposing that sufficient assistance is

to be afforded by the Government - on account of such charges. It will be required to meet in respect of the same.

I have now received your Grace's telegram of November the 10th in which you state that the measure of assistance which is available from the Imperial Government is not sufficient to enable the Government to meet as it was hoped. It is suggested by the Secretary of State that the
relaying of the main line be expedited. As matters stand,
the cost of the relaying is being provided gradually out
of the revenue, and while there is provision
for large expenditure for such things
as the relaying of the main line and lake developments next year,
it is not possible to go beyond existing cash resources, at
least in the main, unless we fully place except as regards
the estimates actually prepared.
If money were available large orders
of course could be placed for 80 lb. material, but the
Administration would for some time, face interest
charges.

The estimated cost of relaying with 80 lb. rails,
for the whole section of 350 miles
is £1,000,000, which, allowing credit for secondhand
material of say £250,000, leaves expenditure of
£750,000 to be met.

Of this approximately one half could be charged to
the Revenue Fund, if the money were available, and the
remainder could suitably be capitalized against
the value of the line, if interest charges could be
met. In addition to the £1,400,000, if the work is to
be expedited, we should allow money for lengthening loops,
for a few additional stations, for heavier engines
as soon as relaying is advanced, and for

larger erecting shop accommodation in the Workshops to deal with the relaying engine. It would probably bring the total cost to approximately £2,000,000.

It is proposed to set aside a sum of £1,000,000 for the purchase of materials and equipment for the extension of the line, including the purchase of the land which has not yet been utilized, but which will be required for the extension.

The Uganda Government is anxious that we should take over the service on the line, and I am equally anxious to do so, but there would require an additional shallow-draft vessel, a wharf and other facilities at Butiaba, and probably, later, a new line between Kasubi Port and Butiaba which could be built of re-processed second-hand material. The requirements of the other line are referred to above.

It is important money should be made available from existing funds to enable us to provide the service to capture the Eastern Congo trade.

It is suggested that the Government, if the Imperial Government is prepared to expedite the construction of the line, should be prepared to assist us financially. It would appear at the present time that we should be able to raise the interest, for a period of 10 years, at the rate of 5%.

view only. I feel, however, that the Government must face
the bigger issues in connection with its own position

The question has been raised as to whether the branches would have been able to pay for themselves from savings on the plant line and revenues prepared 23,000,000, but it is suggested that they be brought under the new proposals for the following reasons:-

(a) If receiving the plant line is expedited and the work being done as money becomes available, the revenue contribution to the funds, then the plant line will require some additional investment for some time.

(b) Advancing the working and using some of the plant line would involve transfer of orders to some extent, which might have been broadened to include some of the assigned loan obligations.

(c) Expediting the work and Kitale branches so that second-hand material may be obtained as quickly as possible from the rail, and also advances payment of interest charges on earthworks, etc., apart from cost of heavy material.

5. The acceptance of this proposal will assist the Colony materially by enabling it to reduce the money required under the 23,000,000 loan, and place it in a much better position to meet its other obligations for a few years and full interest thereafter.
