nderstands to have been the express instructions of the Secretary of ate for the Colonies, to pass a Bill prolonging the presen Lagislaive Council with a view to enable Indians to participate in the next meral election, for the Governor to take upon himself the responsility of postponing the final stages of that measure, in order to press upon the Colonial Office the strength of the Europes non-"icial opposition. Ly Committee feels that failure to proceed with present Bill, which ald rosult. of course, in the auto - tic rmination of the present Legislative Council followed almost immedtely by a general election in which Indians could not part ipate. n only result in the gravest possible consequences in Kenya and iso upon public opinion in India, and I am, therefore, desired to aspectfully request an assurance that instructions will be even mediately to proceed to pass this bill, if necessary by the use of e official majority.

My Committee has viewed with increasing slarm the repeated declaraons on the part of the European settlers of the etermination to
event the enforcement of the policy contained in the proposals
reed upon between the Colonisl and India Offices, after example approval
f the Government of India had been secured. These proposals contain
the very minimum that would, at the present time, satisfy Indian
opinion in Kenya and in India, and any whittling away of them would
be regarded as a violation of the spirit of the Imperial Conference
Resolution.

In transmitting the resolution adopted last year by the indian Assembly, to the Secretary of State for India, the Government of

india observed, "The Indian public regard a satisfactory solution of the Kenya question as a vital test of the British Government's sincerity, and of their willingness to give effect in the Trown clonies to the Resolution passed in respect of the rights of citizenthip at the Imperial Conference lest year, together with the determination of the British Government to prevent the immigration, licy seing altered to the prejudice of Indians."

Having regard to this view, and also to the view expressed in the colonial Office dispatch of the 5th September last, that the immigration figures do not warrant restrictions upon Indian immigration, my committee can only suppose that the reference in the above slegram, to a proposal to impose fresh restrictions upon Indian immigration indicates that, with a view to place at European non-official opinion or that section of it that is most vociferous in the Colony, the covernor has, without authority and instructions, taken it and himself to induce the Indian Community to agree to such fresh restrictions.

My Committee strongly protests against this unwarrante action, and expresses the mope that suitable action will be taken by the Colonial Office to reassure the Indian population in Kenya on this question.
