Sir.

I have the honour to enclose a copy of the circular letters circulated by the European and African Traders' Organisation at Mairobi.

In addition to the political persecution the Europeans are arranging a commercial and economic boyott against the Indians in Kenya. It is most unfortunate that the Municipal Corporation in Hairobi and a Government Administration like the Uganda Railway have been forced under constant pressure by the above said Organisation and appear to have fallen into line with their views, with the result that the Indians are gradually but surely being squeezed out of the Country.

In view of the above, may I request you to expedite the matter and arrange for the negotiations as soon as possible.
