MINUTES

I discussed with Sir R.Coryndon yesterday. He is clear that the area of 2,000 acres on the west side of Mount Kenya originally granted must be given up, although, as the forest has been fully exhausted, there is not much substance in the point. He agrees that the concessionaires should be allowed to emove timber already cut, in fulfilment of current contracts, and there need be no difficulty about that.

As regards survey fees, the Governor thinks that they might be let off the fees in respect of the original idea, as much of the confusion in question has arisen from the Government's inability to survey the forest at the proper time.

In regard to the appeal for an extension of time, Lord Cranworth is right in saying that this has been obscured in the correspondence following

following his letter of last November (58269). There he asked that the exciration of the lease should be rut of: from 1932 to 1941, which in effect wears starting the 20 years' lease from ow instead of from 1312. LEASE OF FOREST TO LORD CRANWORTH AND HON. R. B. COLE.

I have the honour to submit to you the following facts in connection with this Lease, and ask that you may give an early and favourable hearing to the appeal with which the statement concludes.

In 1912 Lord Cranworth and Mr. Cole applied to H B

Sir Percy Giral for a lease of 8,000 acres of forest on the slopes of Mt. Kenya. Their application was favourably considered and granted by H B, which grant was ratified by his successor Sir Henry Belfield.

It should be pointed out here that the applicants neither masked for or received any such monetary concession as was given over vast tracts of forest to previous concessionaires Gastan e.g. Major Orejan. They pay for the area, not only a rent but the same cutting koyalties that any successful applicant for cutting rights receives. Their sole privilege consists in a sure continuity - subject to all safeguards - which enables them to lay down their plant without fear for the immediate future.

Mr. Cole was instructed by sir Henry Belfield to delineste his boundaries. This he did, indicating 6000 scres in a strip running from the Marro Moru river to the Thego river on the mestern slopes of Kenya, and 2000 acres on the South western slopes, (vide letter now in the Forest Office at Nairobi). The Lease was duly signed in 1915, but, doubtless owing to the war and subsequent reconstruction, a surveyor was not actually sent out till the present year. Meanwhile a Capt. Barry had been given outting rights over one half the area for which we had applied. This area he has worked continuously and practically out out. Accordingly on the somewhat belated arrival of the surveyor it was found that of the 6000 acres for which we successfully applied only 2000 were available. In exchange we were offered 4000 acres consisting almost entirely of bamboo on the upper rim of the forest belt, and of scrub bush on the lower rim. neither have any marketable value we were unable to accept the offer. It has since been recommended by the local forest officer that the 4000 acres in question should be attached to the 2000 granted us on the South western slopes, lying further to the South West on that block and bounded by the magati river to the north and the mamathambi river to the South. Phis recommendation seems to us just and reasonable and we are prepared to accept it.

At the same time we venture to appeal for the two forlowing concessions.

- That our lease which expires in 1932 be extended to 1942. We cannot think that this can be fairly objected to seeing that our lease was originally 20 years, and for the first 10 years we have not been in possession of the leased property.
- (2) That the Block of 6000 acres (presuming that the recommendation of the local Forest Officer be upheld; be increased to 12,000 acres. In favour of this we would urge:-
 - (a) That not only is 12,000 acres an insignificant area in comparison with huge concessions granted earlier, but that it is actually a minimum area which would justify the erection of anything larger than a Bush-mill.
 - (b) That we are not asking therein any rights other than those open to the applicant for outting rights. Therefore no injustice to other applicants is to be considered, nor any possibility of loss of kevenue to the Government.
 - (c) That it is manifestly impossible to erect valuable machinery or to raise the necessary capital for an area the life of which is so short.
 - (d) That the area to be leased is less than a twentieth of the timber area in sight on Mt. Kenya.
 - (e) That the timber in this area consists of heavy timber which requires costly machinery both to haul and to convert, and thereby the large quantities of oxen necessitated in small mills are avoided. Such oxen are apt to be detrimental to native interests.
 - (f) That we who are anxious to form a Company for this purpose are already faced not only with the competition of a business rival who is actually working the forest which was originally assigned

to us, but also with those people who are working a concession of ever 100,000 acres on which they have a practically negligible negaty to pay.

we believe that these considerations will enable you to come to the conclusion that our application is a fair and reasonable one, that to grant it will inflict no injustice on any inhabitant black or white, while it will be calculated to bring much-needed capital into the country and revenue to the Government.

I observe, from paragraph 9 of Sir Robert Coryndon's despatch No.371 of the 8th of March, that not only was the attempt made but the application for the transfer of the lease to an Indian was actually It would appear theresanctioned. fore that there must be full documentary evidence existing on the subject, and, while I am not prepared to accept Lord Cranworth's view that such a transaction involved any question of dishonour on the part of the concessionaires or wither of them it is obviously desirable that the matter should be cleared up.
