As to the main suggestion here that the

authorities should be approached with the view of having emigrants to East Africa, Zanzibar and Tanganyika vaccinated before they embark and get permits to come to these Colonies. I am afraid that in present circumstances it is useless to put this proposal to the India Office - we should only expose ourselves to the retort that Indian immigrants ought not to be discriminated against in this way and that if any such regulation is made it ought to be applied to all immigrants indiscriminately. The alternative is to write to the Governors informing them of the suggestion, observing above as regards the probable attitude of the India Office, and asking for their observations whether it would be practicable to introduce a regulation to apply to immigrants equally, providing that unless they can furnish a certificate that they have been vaccinated within the preceding 12 months they must submit themselves to vaccination within 7 days of arrival.



 expressed by Dr. Paterson.

2. The Secretary of State calls special
 attention to the appointment of Medical Officers
 for exerting the supervision of vaccination in
 the reserves.

would be possible to carry out these
 recommendations if the Medical Officers provided
 for in the estimates were appointed.

In this connexion I have the honour to
 call your attention to the present shortage of
 staff. There are over ten Medical Officers short
 of the prescribed establishment. Instead of
 eleven Medical Officers of Health provided for
 in the estimates we have only three at present
 on duty.

3. In my opinion, failure of vaccination
 in this country has been largely due in the part
 to:-

(a) Unseasonableness at the time vaccination
 is performed.

Frequently large numbers of natives have
 been vaccinated in the brilliant sunshine. In
 the tropics it is essential that the lymph should
 be kept in the shade.

(b) The quality of the lymph supplied.

Recently a great improvement has been
 effected - see the latest Annual Report of the
 Senior Bacteriologists.

4. On the organisation of the department
 for Native Affairs is more complete. I trust that
 the Commissioner will be able to assist not only
 in collecting natives for vaccination but in
 recording the results.

5. The whole the natives of this country
 appreciate the advantages of vaccination. They
 are not troubled to any great extent with con-
 scientious objectors.
