I hope they will commend themselves to you. With regard to the last paragraph, we can't agree to give carte-blanche to the Governors.

Sir,

With reference to my despatch No. 524 of the 11th of August, I have the honour to inform you that I have had under further discussion with the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury the question of the computation of the pension of "Isolated Officers" in connection with the case of Mr. S.H. Carr, which forms the subject of my despatch No. of even date.

The Lords Commissioners have agreed that in all cases, where an officer, whatever his title, can properly be regarded as belonging to an established class on account of similarity of rank, and identity of the scale or rate of remuneration he may be regarded as belonging to such class for the purpose of computation of pension, so as to enable his pension in the event of his having been in such class for three years to be calculated on his actual emoluments at the date of retirement. In the case of the Exchequer aided Protectorate Their Lordships will be glad to receive a certificate by the Governor to the effect that the officer in question may be regarded as belonging to such and such a class, which certificate should appear on the superannuation papers forwarded from the Protectorate, accompanied by an explanation of the grounds on which the same is issued.

Mr. Bottomley,

After my interview at the Treasury yesterday I have had time to consider the case of Mr. D. H. Hamilton to which you directed me to pay attention. I discuss this with other "Officers" generally we are agreed that it is a bad case. I from my personal knowledge of the facts of the case have reached the same conclusion. I think though they are of the same type as the case of Mr. G. C. Cross, the Governor has no right to accept such a case. I am informed by the Governor that he has given his assent though very reluctantly to the case of Mr. J. H. Bradford. I do not know what has been done about the case of Mr. D. H. Hamilton.

I think no good can be done in regard to this case or to the case of Mr. D. H. Hamilton both belonging to a Law Officer and Medical Officer - but it won't help us with the case of Mr. G. C. Cross or with the case of a P.M.O. if such a case comes along. We can only hope that by a slow process of wearing away the principle we may in the end get rid of it altogether.

I submit drafts herewith of despatches to our Governors which I promised Lord Cross that I would let him see before they actually went (no need to show to the Treasury paragraph 3 of our despatch to Kenya). If the Treasury agree to this draft we can then at once take up the cases of Mr. Bryan and Bradford.
