SIR

I am directed by the Secretary of State to acknowledge the receipt of Sir Herbert Read's despatch of 16th August, No. 22309/20, and Mr. Grindlays letter of the 21st August, No. 41497/20, on the subject of the despatch, addressed to the Governor of Kenya, conveying the decisions of the Secretary of State on the Colonies on various questions concerning the position of India in East Africa.

A summary of these decisions was forwarded to the Government of India by telegraph on the 21st August with a view to publication, and a copy of the despatch was sent to the Secretary of State on the same date.

With regard to the question of the despatch, I am to state that Mr. Secretary of State does not fully understand the reference to a despatch sent by the Indian Government for the purpose of instructing a selected force of Indian agricultural settlers.

No such document has ever been prepared. Vice-Admiral Milner will, however, remember that it was suggested that a deputation of experts in agricultural settlement should be sent from India to Tanganyika with a view to examining the suitability of local conditions in that Mandate territory for a settlement of Indians of a desirable class (preferably agriculturists and ex-service men). It was suggested in the Government of India's


despatch of 25th December 1919, copy of which was transmitted to the Colonial Office with the letter from this department on 11th February 1920, No. J.2 P. 418/20, that much a deputation should proceed as soon as possible. In Sir Herbert Read's letter of 5th March 1920, 10.1975/10, it was stated that there would appear to be no objection in principle to such a course being taken, but that the question of the proposed visit could not very well be decided until the views of the administrator had been received in regard to the question of the land actually available for settlement. Mr. Montagu has been informed by Sir H. Read's letter of 17th August, No. 40080/20, that the views of the Administrator on this point have not yet been received.

I am to enquire whether the reference in paragraph 6 of the despatch to the Governor of Kenya quoted above is based on the proposed appointment of a deputation to visit Tanganyika. There would appear to be no reason why such a deputation, if it proceeds to Tanganyika, should not extend its visit to Kenya in order to avail itself of the opportunity of inspecting the land to be set apart in that colony for the agricultural settlement of Indians already domiciled in East Africa. But I am to enquire whether a decision may shortly be expected on the preliminary point which is still pending as

to land available in Tanganyika referred to in the letter of 6th March cited above.

As regards Sir B. Robertson's visit to Dar-es-Salaam referred to in Sir Herbert Read's letter of 17th August, Lord Milner is aware that the unexpected duration of the proceedings of the Asiatic Enquiry Commission in South Africa made it necessary for Sir B. Robertson to prolong his stay in that country beyond the date originally anticipated. He has now, however, left South Africa with a view to visiting Tanganyika, Kenya and Uganda, and discussing with the local administrations the outstanding general questions in regard to the position of Indians in those territories.
