It seems to me a great pity that this matter  
was rushed through without any reference  
being made & I question very much whether  
under the Ordinance the Governor had the  
power to raise a Unit of the Legion of  
Frontiersmen which, if called out for  
service, would undoubtedly save in one  
most important point, viz the selection of  
these new officers, under different conditions  
to that of the rest of the Volunteer  
Reserve. From para 2 of The Governor's  
Despatch of the 13<sup>th</sup> Feb he seems to be  
clearly of the opinion that this is not so,  
and that each unit would save under  
its own elected officers. Although of course  
every consideration would naturally be  
given to the wishes of the members in  
the appointment of officers, paras 36 & 37

of the Ordinance of Aug 1910 (25570) clearly  
lay down that the Govt appoint those, &  
might even appoint officers not members  
belonging to the Unit. This is a very different  
thing from their selecting their own officers,  
which is a course actively opposed to the  
basis on which the forces throughout the  
empire are officered and is I believe causing

to the practice of every civilized nation.  
 We are now placed in a somewhat awkward position and one which would have delighted the Pharaohs of old - for if we disallow the Ordnance it will be looked upon as throwing cold water on the voluntary principle which of course we are anxious to do, on the other hand to allow the Ordnance as it stands would create a most dangerous precedent and one that in the future will probably raise most awkward questions. I would recommend taking the line that we wish to encourage in every way the voluntary movement and fully recognize the value of such men as compose the Legion but in view of the decision taken by the Government in dealing with the 1st of Frontiersmen it must be clearly understood that officers can only be appointed subject to the Governor's approval in the same way as other units of the Force and that although there is no reason against them calling themselves "The Legion of Frontiersmen" their designation cannot be officially applied (see W.O. Letter 21<sup>st</sup> Dec 8075)

As I understand the matter, the Legion of Frontiersmen Unit will be in exactly the same position as any other Unit with the

following exceptions.

- i. all its members will be members of the Legion
- ii. all its members will be Field Service members.

The only result of these two differences will be

- i. That (Article No. 5 of the order of 1930) the unit will always be commanded by a member of the Legion
- ii. That the unit will not be confined to service in any particular district of the Protectorate.

Are the units whatever their nature have the right, subject to the approval of the Governor, to elect their own Officer see S. 5, G.O. 36. And the L of C.
