Sir,

With reference to your enquiry of the 2nd Instant No. 7880:13, I beg to acquaint you for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies that Mr. W. H. Furlonger late Lieutenant, East Lancashire Regiment, joined that regiment as 2nd Lieutenant on 22nd April 1903, was promoted Lieutenant, 29th May 1905, and resigned his Commission 7th February, 1912.

During his service his Confidential Reports were at times qualified. In that dated October 1904, he was professionally efficient and did his duty well, but wanted energy and go and hardly realised his responsibilities; those dated December 1904 and January 1906 were satisfactory, but in December 1906, he had lapsed again though he began to show some improvement. He was not observant or energetic by nature. In January 1908 he was reported as incorrigibly lazy and unreliable, and did not take an interest in his profession.

In January 1909, when he had only returned to duty from sick leave two months before, and when his Commanding Officer had seen little of him, he was reported to be a good leader in the field; he was of a very touchy disposition but worked

worked willingly if encouraged. A report dated May 1909 showed an improvement, but this was not maintained in the following February when he was described as working well spasmodically, and thus required careful supervision, his touchy disposition being again alluded to.

The latest report dated September 1911, showed that he had made a distinct effort in his work, and if that was maintained he would likely do well. He was, however, not up to the professional standard, but if he put his mind to it there was no reason why he should not reach that level. He was not energetic by nature, and had not much influence with his brother subalterns.
