

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit herewith a list of all cattle, sheep and children taken together with their respective leading cattle, donkeys which have left Laikipia since August 1949. They are all reasonably well and in the condition of sheep which were probably not much better than half a million the numbers being so large it was impossible to prevent thousands more being taken and had been hunted out for the separate moves.

2. From all reports obtained the losses are believed to have been very little, if any greater than would have been the case had the stock remained on Laikipia over the same period.

3. Malaria was rife both in Laikipia and the South, from which many hundreds of beasts died. Veterinary Officers were in charge in both Areas and did all that science dictated.

4. Sheep suffered on one or two occasions, in one instance especially considerable loss was sustained on

This is something I have written to Captain Mavor's care,  
and forwarded to the Veterinary Officers.

Mr H. D. Read has handled the bulk of the stock  
during it has been in his charge with the help of one or  
two men. He took charge of the stock and loaded it on suitable Arrows  
and carts. He is a man of great knowledge of handling large  
quantities of stock and has a good idea of the country. I  
think he will be invaluable in the future. He  
will be in command of the stock.

The "Opano" has undoubtedly been in charge of the  
stock since the 1st of October last. In fact both with Mr Morrison  
and Mr Grews Read has been in command. He will be a valuable  
officer.

Mr Grews Read was in communication with the  
first Maori who included him in their party. This  
will be remembered that Mr Morrison and Mr Grews Read  
met together with a proposition which they were to delay  
paying or so on the border of Lord Delamere's and Mr  
Morrison's lands, in order that Legalishu might sell bullocks  
to find money for fees. As this was the first notification  
Government had that the Maori had any connection  
with Mr Morrison and it was inadvisable in any case that  
the move should be delayed at that point, I consider  
Mr Grews Read was quite justified in moving on and he  
did very good work and took great care in getting Legalishu  
to his destination, the latter expressing his thanks for  
the considerate way in which he had been treated.
