Mr. Broome who holds the appointment of an unestablished Veterinary Inspector under the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, was seconded for 20 months in connection with the outbreak of rinderpest in Uganda and subsequently on the 10th October 1912, transferred to the East Africa Protectorate.

3. He has been provided with a single first class passage to England by the S.S. "Goth" due to sail on or about the 11th May 1913.

I have the honour to transmit herewith a list of all Maasi, [redacted] children [redacted] together with their [redacted] including cattle, [redacted] donkeys, [redacted] have left [redacted] are all reasonably [redacted] sheep which were probably [redacted] than half a million the numbers being so [redacted] impossible to prevent thousands more being [redacted] had been counted out for the separate moves.

2. From all reports obtained the losses are believed to have been very little, if any, greater than would have been the case had the stock remained on Laikipia [redacted] the [redacted] period.

3. Rinderpest was rife, both in Laikipia and the South [redacted] which many hundreds of beasts died. Veterinary Officers were in charge in both Areas and did all that science dictated.

4. Sheep suffered on one or two occasions, in one instance especially considerable loss was sustained on [redacted]

throughout the whole move. This I consider is due to Captain Grewe's care and attention, and to the Veterinary Officers.

Mr. H. B. Grewe handled the bulk of the stock. It has crossed the border with the help of one of the best stock inspectors and passed it on suitable grounds. He has a great knowledge of handling large numbers of stock and a sound idea of the country. I consider this officer invaluable in the work. He has been in charge of the stock throughout been in charge of the stock. He has been in contact both with the Government and the local authorities. He will be a valuable addition to the Office.

Mr. Grewe Read was the first to move with the first batch which included the best of the stock. It was observed that Mr. Grewe Read and Mr. Grewe Read together with a proposition that the Government should delay the move on the border of Lord Delanere's and Mr. Whinner's lands, in order that Legalisthu might sell bullocks to find money for fees. As this was the first notification Government had that the Masai had any connection with Mr. Whinner and it was inadvisable in any case that the move should be delayed at that point, I consider Mr. Grewe Read was quite justified in moving on, and he did very good work and took great care in getting Legalisthu to his destination, the latter expressing his thanks for the considerate way in which he had been treated.
