I fear that you may find that the question is not finally settled yet; for every detachment maintained at an outstation entails an equal number of men maintained at headquarters for relief purposes and recent reports have emphasized the danger of unrelieved posts + consequent dissatisfaction among the troops

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that news has been brought in that 41 Abyssinian hunters arrived at Ajao from Gudduduma the day before yesterday and are terrorising the natives there, beating and otherwise illtreating them and robbing their stock. Their leader is said to be one Aba Nyencha, whose name is well known to me. He was one of the leaders of the Tigre in their raid some months ago on the Yaben and since that date has committed some other offences on our side of the line. Garazmatch Gaahi has gone to Gudduduma and this movement of hunters out of that place is a good sign, as it means the Abyssinian troops are looking for them.

2. I am proceeding to Ajao to look into the matter.
