My dear Reed

(as the finances of His

Protectorate are not increasing sufficiently rapidly to admit of large public works being constructed in the near future) it has been found necessary to still further reduce the establishment of His Department as soon as possible consistent with existing agreements with its various offices.

Therefore the services of a number of temporary superintendents, &c., have already been dispensed with; and moreover, by H.E.'s orders I have written to inform you that my active services

will be required - (also that  
Lyndall, may soon leave on full  
pay for three months at any time  
from now to the end of Decem br next,  
then he will not be re-engaged after  
his leaves up).

H.F. was unfortunately on tour  
when I heard from Morson, but I  
understand from Bourne that his  
Socy will recommend me for 6 months  
leave, or an equivalent money value  
to be paid on 31/3/11, so I am being  
treated quite generously.

In my departure I believe  
the post of Commissioner P.W.D. will  
be abolished, & Macgregor Ross  
will be quite capable of being  
again Head of the Department

after all that has been done in the  
way of organization to be in the past  
3 years.

Now I have no wish to remain  
idle when I leave B.E.Africa, so I  
shall be very grateful if you will  
kindly ascertain of the C.O. will  
give me another appointment any  
time after March next to some  
other colony. Of course I should  
prefer six months leave before  
taking up fresh work, but rather  
than lose a new billet I would  
not take any leave at all.

In connection with possible  
vacant appointments I may mention  
that I saw Boyle today on his way  
Home, & he told me Usborne is getting

not content if I ask for £800 a year  
 - (I draw £1200 a year in B.E.A.) - in  
 Uganda & a four years agreement. If  
 however Uganda funds cannot at present  
 afford this salary then I am prepared  
 to take Usborne's salary - viz £750  
<sup>a</sup> year - but taking into consideration  
 the disparity of age, of length of service  
 & experience between us I think I am  
 not unreasonable in asking for £800  
<sup>a</sup> year; the more especially as I lose  
 £130 a year of my Indian Pension by  
 living in a country with a Rupee currency  
 & also have to pay topographical rates for  
 Subscriptions to Widows & Orphans Fund  
 & Insurance Remissions.

I regret that H.E. is not here

up his appointment in Uganda (the latter  
I am sorry to hear at present in Hospital) —  
There you told Boyle that I should be glad  
to take Usborne's appointment if M.  
Clare (who, very young) was not going to  
succeed him.

Should I be given his appointment  
I do not know if I can leave here before  
1/4/11, but if Sir Peay can dispense with my  
services and matters can be so arranged  
by the B.E.A. and Uganda Government  
that I do not suffer any severe financial  
loss, I am prepared to lose a little in the  
matter — I am willing to leave the former  
Protectorate whenever Sir Peay sees his  
way to letting me go — much as I should  
regret giving up my very interesting work  
here before my present detention comes  
to an end.

As regards terms I think I am

Consult, but as the Uganda Health's  
Report of Usborne goes Home next month,  
I take the liberty of addressing you now.

As regards my Service, no here  
I am not being got rid of so soon as  
told me the other day, because I have  
been a failure; but solely because the

Protectorate has not the Funds with  
which to keep me on, on active service,  
after the end of the financial year.

My leave pay however be a  
charge on the Funds of this Protectorate  
whether I take leave in April 1911,  
or go to Uganda then, or before that.  
Without taking leave, however how  
ever is away in Mombasa to do  
not know the Rules which apply  
to an officer who has leave due from  
me Protectorate, and goes straight to

Service in another one, without having  
been able to avail himself of it, 399

As regard, health I am really  
feeling as fit & strong now as when I  
left England in August 1907. It may  
however be argued that I ought not  
to serve for four years or more without  
taking leave. My answer to this is  
that I was in India from December

1875 to July 1882, from October 1882  
to March 1884, from June 1886 to

June 1894, from September 1895  
to April 1901, & from October 1901 to

April 1907, so why should I not  
be able to stay for as long periods  
in B.C.A. & Uganda as in India  
without injury to my health?

If course if Usborne is not giving up  
his appointment please consider my  
application for his post as cancelled;  
but kindly try & get me work else  
-where next year

My grand daughter is going very strong  
I am glad to say & both my daughters  
& my wife are very fit. Bonny had a  
cold but the change to the Coast should  
enable him to get rid of it. Nanohi  
is very busy & a number of officials  
are taking advantage of H.E.'s absence  
& are on the tour.

Will you kindly forward the  
enclosed letter to Boyle? If so I shall  
be much obliged
