carrying weight. He is unlikely to
propose a course of action which will
lead to difficulties.

It seems to me to be unwise to
issue instructions to Major Hickox
to proceed at once to the dismemberment
of the basinian. He may well
be left a free hand to deal with
the situation if he has a sufficient
force.

To carry out drastic measures
at an unfavourable period

certainly considerate force and expense. But a consideration adopted, with a sufficient force to take advantage of any favourable opportunity which may present itself, may produce a much more satisfactory situation in say a year's time than exists at present.

I would therefore advise that the 1st and 2nd batt. of Sircul be kept up to such a strength - a column of 250 men may be sent more at short notice to seize an opportunity. Such a move necessitates about 150 men being left at the advanced base and on the line of communications.

I would recommend that a Company be moved at once from Dganda to Sircul, that the Camel Corp be kept up to its full strength (120) its detachment being moved to from Jibowen, and further that a small company be formed without delay. This would give Major Dickson a chance of producing such a situation as will avoid the large

expedition which would be involved if we are forced to deal with the warlike at an unseasonable time. The camel transport must be kept up to an adequate number unless he has the mobility which mounted men will give him, it is unlikely that Major Dickson can effect a great deal with his small force.

PARAPHRASE TELEGRAM

Communication to the East African Protectorate
or to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Received Colonial Office 4.35 p.m. 1st September, 1913.)

[Answered by No 30570]

Have received your telegram of the 29th of August. Graham states as follows :- The military situation in the Marehan country is normal and there is no immediate military reason to disarm but it is desirable for political reasons. The ultimatum given to Ali Deri and Ahmet Wet to surrender arms by the 15th of August has not been complied with and I fear that inaction on our part following almost immediately the recent incident of Northern Somaliland must enhance Somali opinion of their own importance and affect our prestige. Also chance of Marehan effecting combination with Garre and Aulihan, which is highly improbable now will be increased if action is delayed. Successful action on our part should check gun running among the Marehan but no other tribes. I have already ordered remaining fit camels proceed Serenli from Gebwen so I believe (that) one Company will be sufficient to deal with Marehan. The present authorised establishment of the transport should be sufficient but there naturally will be increased casualties which will require replacement. Graham's statement ends here. It is my own view that unless we enforce disarmament we shall be considered to be too weak to assert ourselves and the effect not only on the Marehan but also on all Somalis and Frontier tribes will be very serious. The presence of a large military force who issue orders and do not enforce them must discredit troops before the tribes. As Graham believes disarmament feasible with the reinforcements suggested I think it should take place.
