RAILWAY STAFF  
TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES

Summits explanation as to provision in Railways by Estimate for travelling allowances and increments of the Headquarters Staff.

Mr Head (Secretary General)

It appears that the Estimate contains provision for £600 p.m. travelling allowance to the superior staff (the old P.G.S. was to stand to £450 in 24 day compound) & that the £450 is to be paid compound to those at the new P.G.S. rate, i.e. £450 being the superior staff.

The £600 is not capable of identification w. the Estimates, being answered with "Contingencies" and, in some cases, with the travelling allowances of subordinates.

We do not appear to have sufficient to the rates of G.A. to subordinates, and shall if this could while acting about it.

It appears also that "Contingencies" include any increment which may be granted to a subordinate staff. But the superior staff

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 601 of the 25th of July regarding the travelling allowance for the staff of the Uganda Railway.

2. The item "Contingencies" in the Railway Abstracts in the Estimates for the current year includes travelling allowances, increases to salaries, and ordinary contingencies, except in cases where "Contingencies" and "Travelling Allowances" are shown separately under the same sub-head, when the former item comprises increases to salaries and contingencies only. The scales of salaries of the Railway Subordinate Staff are not automatically incremental, such increments being granted at the discretion of the General Manager alone. It has for some time therefore been the practice to insert against each post in the Estimates the actual amount of the emoluments enjoyed by the holder thereof, and to provide for increments under "Contingencies". By this means the holder of a subordinate post on the Railway has no definite anticipation

anticipation that his salary will be increased and thereby no grounds for applying for a higher salary on the plea that the necessary provision appears in the Estimates. I consider this practice eminently justifiable and I see no grounds for recommending that it should be discontinued.

3. As regards the sum of £480 provided for travelling allowances in the current year I have to observe that the revised scale affects only the members of the superior staff and that this amount refers to their expenses alone. The total sum paid in 1912-13 in this manner amounted to nearly £600. This year the establishment is practically the same and the manager does not expect that the staff will travel more than in former years. He has, therefore, taken four-ninths of £600 i.e. £480 as the Estimate for 1913-14.
