Sir,

With reference to your despatch No. 179 of the 2nd of April 1913 respecting excesses on services for which provision has been made on the Estimates,

I have the honour to inform you of the amount of excess over the amounts allowed for the following works which were commenced last year and have recently been completed:-

- (a) Five quarters for Officers in Nairobi provided for in the Estimates for 1912-13.
- (b) House for an Officer at Kombasa.

2. In the former case it has been estimated that the excess will amount to £400. The amount allowed for each quarter was £550 at which two houses were erected by contract. The contractor then offered to erect the remaining two houses at £710 each on account of a mistake made in his original contract. The excess thus involved would have been £120, but the offer was refused with the result that the houses were built departmentally at a cost of £650 each instead of £550 as authorized, the excess incurred being £400.

3. An examination of the accounts has led to the formation of the following conclusions:-

- (a) That the charges for labour are excessive due to lack of effective supervision.
- (b) That a portion of the excess is due to the increased cost of transport last year and delay in delivery of materials. The local transport riders were unable to cope with the sudden boom in the building trade.
- (c) The steady rise in cost of materials both local and imported.
- (d) Shortage of labour and extra expense incurred by inability to keep artisans supplied with material and assistance.

The excess on labour is due to lack of supervision. An Assistant Engineer was available for a portion of the year only and for the remaining period it was not possible to spare more than one Engineer to take charge of the Division thus rendering adequate supervision impracticable.

5. With regard to the house at Mombasa the Acting Director of Public Works estimates the excess on this work to be Rs 35 and considers this to be due to the following causes:-

- (a) To lack of proper supervision, due to the inefficiency of the Engineer in charge, Mr. Gordon Wright.
- (b) To the squaring of stone to an unnecessary extent.
- (c) To the supply of tanks for temporary use pending a water supply being available.



6. It will thus be seen that the total excess incurred amounts to a sum of £635 in respect of the works at both Nairobi and Mombasa. This excess will be charged to General Revenue and met by savings on the Public Works Extraordinary Vote, as there is no existing sub-head to which it could be properly charged. I have accordingly authorized the postponement of Public Works Item 21, £640 Extraordinary Vote and I trust that in the circumstances you will accord your sanction to my action in the matter.
