Sir.

I have the honour to refer to the correspondence terminating with Lord Crewe's despatch No.288 of the 27th of April 1910 respecting an increase in the salary of Abdurahman bin Ahmed the Sheikh-ul-Islam and to address you further on the subject.

2. The duties of this official are of purely judicial nature and he exercises no magisterial functions. He also sits as adviser and assessor to the High Court and forms with a Judge of that Court an Appellate Court for the hearing of appeals from cases decided by the Kathis. He is thus in constant touch with the Courts and his duties are in no way connected with the Provincial Administration. I am of opinion therefore that it would be more correct for his name to appear in future on the list of staff of the Judicial Department, and I am supported in this view by the Chief Justice and the Provincial Commissioner.

Sheikh-al-Inles has performed his duties and considers that the high office which he fills with such distinction with regard to the Mchanedan Community is deserving of more substantial resumeration than that at present attached to it which is only equal to that of a 3rd Grade Clerk with the addition of a house.
