Sir:-

I have had under my consideration in communication with His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, your despatch No. 9 Treaty, of March 18th last on the subject of the application made by the Belgian Government for the surrender from British East Africa of the fugitive offender M. Kapsopoulos.

I request that you will inform the Belgian Government that the surrender of this man from the Union of South Africa was requested by the Congo authorities last year. It was then explained to the latter that, in the absence of any extradition agreement between this country and the Congo His Majesty's Government could not permit the surrender of Kapsopoulos if found within the territory of the Union. The same considerations apply as regards his surrender from British East Africa.

however states that, though extradition is impracticable in this case, in certain circumstances it is possible to deport undesirables from the East Africa Protectorate, and that, if the Belgian Government will supply His Majesty's Government with the dossier of the case, as suggested in Monsieur Davignon's Note, and if facts are thereby disclosed which make deportation permissible, the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate will be instructed to consider the question of putting into operation the provisions of the Immigration Restriction Ordinance No. 17 of 1906 of which a copy is enclosed for communication to the Belgian Government. The sections which bear more particularly on the case of Kapsopoulos are Nos. 5 f and 9 taken together and No. 12.
