With reference to your letter of the Athultimo
No. 25893/12, concerning the Mail Service with Pritish East
Africa and Zanzibar, I am directed by the Postmaster General
to state, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of
the Treasury, that, as mentioned in the last paragraph of the
letter from this Office of the 20th of December last,
reasonable facilities will still be afforded by existing
services for sending Mails to Pritish East Africa and
Zanzibar even if a controlled Mail Service by the East Africa
Line of the Union Castle Mail Steamship, Company is not
arranged.

A statement is enclosed showing the opportunities for the despatch of Mails to Pritish East Africa and Zanzibar during the first quarter of this year, from which it will be seen that, even if no Mails were sent either by the British India Line or by the Union Castle Line, there would still be a Mail Service three times a month under the present arrangement of French and German sailings. The intervals between the sailings many since the Pronch service - like the Union Castle - is every four weeks, while the two German services are both performed back in

each Calendar wonth. It will be noticed that Mails for tanziber sent by French Packet arrive at their destination two days before the Union Castle Steamship is due although despetched from London five days later. This has only been so since the beginning of this year when the dates of sailing of the French Packets were altered.

The Time Table of the Union Castle boats on their outward woyage allows for a stay of five days at Kilindini (Mombasa), whereas the French boats are scheduled to proceed on the following day. It is understood that the provision of additional lighters and wharfage accommodation at Kilindini is in progress; and the Union Castle Company expect to find themselves able to shorten their stay at that port and to accelerate arrival at Zanzibar proportionately.

As the statement shews, the Mail Service with British East Africa is at present mainly dependent upon foreign lines of steamships, and it cannot be said that it would be much less so if a contract were concluded with the Union Castle Company for the continuance of the present Steamship Service as a Mail Service.

From the point of view of the Post Office a subsidized service by the East African Line of Steamships of the Union Sattle Company is not a necessity. Mails are at present sent by the Union Castle Steamships from Aden when there is an advantage in point of time in doing so; and payment for the conveyance of the correspondence is made at the Ship. Letter rate of id. per packet. So far as the Post Office is concerned, and while the call at Aden is maintained, this arrangement might continue as regards Letter Mails.

and reguliations might be entered into separately with the Union Castle Company for the pranamission of Parcel Mails to Rhodesia and Myssaland by the Stemships of their East African Line.

It is understood that the question of the granting of a subsidy to the Company is not entirely an open one since the Agreement between the Crown Agents for the Colonies and the Union Castle Mail Steamship Company, which was signed on the 12th of August 1910, promises in clause 5 that "His Majesty's "Government will do their best to arrange for the carriage of "Mails outward and homeward by the Steamers of the Union "Castle Company, paying to the said Company a proper subsidy "for the work done in connexion with carrying Mails".

In consideration of this obligation and of the view expressed by Their Lordships (Treasury Letter of the 2nd of May 1911, No. 8085/11) that, failing an arrangement with the Fritish India Company, negotiations might be opened with the Dnion Castle Line for an improved service such as would justify a transfer of the subsidy, from the British India Company, the Postmaster General thought it proper, before proceeding to negotiate, to submit the case for Their Lordships Turther consideration. In doing so he walued the service, as explained, at the highest figure which can properly be assigned to it from a postal moint of view.

With regard to the last paragraph of Their Larlahins' letter under reply, the mostal justification for subsidising the Union Castle Line has no doubt been alightly disinished by alterations made in the French and Jerman Services with some ponsequent improvement of these alternative facilities

of communication. But as Their Lordships are sware the Postmaster General has frequently nointed out that the subsidy of £9,000 to the British India Line can only be partly justified on postal grounds; and he has therefore inferred that Their Lordships, in acquiescing in its continuance, have been actuated by other considerations and those of commerce or prestige. Whether such consideration should now carry less weight than they have done in the past is a matter on which Mr. Samuel feels that Their Lordships will not expect him to express an opinion.
