In answer to the letter of the 5th January from the Secretary All Moslem League addressed to the Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, to which I have been asked to reply, have the honour to suggest that the League be informed that the restrictions imposed on the occupation by Indians of office premises leased at Kilindini were not intended to subject them to any racial disability, but were necessitated by sanitary considerations.

2. Indians are in the habit of living in their places of business, which is seldom or never the case with Europeans, and it was in order to prevent
