POSITION OF INDIANS

Suggest that the All Mosley League should be informed that the restrictions imposed on the occupation of Indians of office premises at Milindini were not intended to subject them to any racial disability but were necessitated by sanitary considerations. If this is thought harsh and unjustifiable it would be to substitute a clause in the occupation subject to such conditions irrespective of race as may be decided by the Medical Authorities.

In answer to the letter of the 5th January from the Secretary All Moslem League addressed to the Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, to which I have been asked to reply, have the honour to suggest that the League be informed that the restrictions imposed on the occupation by Indians of office premises leased at Kilindini were not intended to subject them to any racial disability, but were necessitated by sanitary considerations.


