A Native's Death at Makindu.

At the Police Court on Tuesday afternoon before Mr. E. R. Logan, a Goat named Michael Massarembas, was brought up on a charge of causing hurt to a native boy at Makindu, by striking and kicking him, with the result that he died from a ruptured spleen.

The Sub-assistant surgeon in charge at Makindu deposed that on the morning of the 3rd August he was present at the Makindu Police Station when the native in question died. As the result of a postmortem examination witness found that death was due to a ruptured spleen. There were no marks of violence on the body. The spleen was very much enlarged. A fall might have caused the enlargement.

A native sprang to bearing a quarrel between deceased and accused's father. Accused begged father to go to his (accused's) house. They both went, and when out in the house a short time witness heard deceased cry out as though he was being hurt. Deceased ultimately came out and at the same time, accused kicked and knocked him down. Deceased got up and walked towards the Police Station. Accused said to witness afterwards - "If you will tell different words to the Magistrate than what you told at the Station, I will give you Rs. 100." Witness said "alright," but did not mean it. He did not, however get any money.

The case was adjourned.

On Wednesday, the accused was brought up on remand and sentenced to pay a fine of Rs. 150 or 14 days imprisonment.
