Dear Dr Sandwith,

I return the letter from Miss Newry which you left with me. I find that Dr Baker was in the Colonial service from 1st September 1906 until his death on 12th June 1909. He was an excellent officer, whose work, both in the Nairobi Civil Hospital and in the Sleeping Sickness Camp, was thought much of; he was Principal Medical Officer of the East Africa Protectorate. It appears that he did not die of sleeping sickness, but of malaria followed by jaundice; but there seems no doubt that he contracted his last illness in the execution of his duty in an unhealthy district. His widow was granted the maximum rate of pay which could be given under the regulations.

I hope this will be sufficient for your purposes.
