I have the honour to confirm my telegram
of the 14th inst. and to express once more
a very deep regret at the unfortunate mischance
to which your repeated telegraphic requests
for reply to your despatch No. 536 of 3 September
1912 regarding Mr. Emil Test's claim have
been overlooked.

I find it exceedingly difficult to explain what has
occurred, since the whereabouts of the file,
which, in spite of a most careful search, cannot
be traced in the Secretariat at Nairobi. I am con-
sequently only in possession of duplicates of
am entirely at a loss to understand why no action
was taken on your telegram of May 1st, 1913,
June 27th and September 1st of last year.

3. Our last record of the case is in a return
from the Attorney General's office with a
date of December 1913. Mr. Test's claim
for expenses, a copy of which I now enclose. This

been transmitted to you directly it was received, and I can recollect no reason why it should have been held back.

4. Since December 1912 there is no note of a file having passed out of our archives but it is possible that it may have been handed to a member of Executive Council or Head of a Department in the office and ~~taken away~~ by him. This occasionally happens though every endeavour is made to check papers removed in such a way. Inquiries made in all likely quarters have been, however, without result.

5. The telegrams received from you in May and September were decoded in the ordinary way but the original decoded copies, which would naturally have been placed in the file, are forthcoming and my inference is that they were either in the office during those months or telegrams inserted in it or that they were sent out to somebody who was known to have possession of it for insertion. The latter is more probable though we have no proof of it. If they had themselves been available, it is almost certain that no action should have been taken on repeated enquiries.

6. I mentioned Mr. Combe in my telegram of the 14th because the Attorney General is the best person to have possession of one of our files. This question in particular was one which has previously been referred to his office. It is therefore, possible that he may be able to throw some light on the matter, though a search through his archives
