There is very little here that calls for comment.
In spite of the fact that "the expected
increase in Railway traffic will not
be realised" — as to wh. I think
we might ask for further inf.,
~~increased road passenger~~
~~and goods traffic~~
resulting in a reduction of the
estimated surplus of revenue in
1913-14 from £59,000 to £41,500,
the balance at 31 March 1914 is
now put at £276,456 instead of
£292,625. This is satisfactory.

We have an even better margin
over the minimum reserve balance
of £200,000 than we thought.

if we find that the Russian
expedition is costing us a large
amount, we shall have plenty
in hand with which to meet the
cost.

The Treasury memorandum
explains clearly the various
increases, except that I will like to
enquire why under the Education
Head £7400 would be called on
technical education, as both
the only explanation is that it was
not required. There is a good deal
of said for technical education,
& we do not want it to be deleted.

You will notice in looking
through the explanation of increased
exp. that Steamship transport &
merchandise etc. figures account
for a large sum. This we must
be prepared for.

There is one figure given in
the foot-note to the Supplementary
Statement, viz £17000 said to have
been received on C.O. conf. trip 2
20 Sept 1913 (see Diary 31607/13).

1. It will be observed that the amount shown in the Supplementary Estimate as anticipated savings differs from the sum, £37,500, shown as "Estimated Savings on expenditure originally sanctioned for 1913-14" in the Statement, partly estimated, of Assets and Liabilities on 31st March 1914, and printed on page 107 of the draft Estimates for 1914-15,

This difference is due to the fact that the sum of £37,500 represents the gross anticipated savings, and, similarly, the figures of "excesses on certain votes, £22,268" the gross anticipated excess; that is the only possible way of arriving at the estimated savings and excesses respectively at the time (October) the Statement is prepared.

The figures now appearing in the Supplementary Estimate are the net excesses (after including expenditure shown as sum or balance from increased rates due to uncompleted services 1912-13) and the net savings (vile C.O. Despatch 179 of 2nd April 1912), in other words part of the gross savings (£37,500) has been utilised in meeting excesses on subheads which however may not have caused a net excess on a head of expenditure.

2. In the Statement referred to above the estimated surplus of Assets over Liabilities on 31st March 1914 was put down at £192,625; from the figures however now available, and taking the

The reduction in the estimated surplus of revenue is due to the fact that the expected increase in Railway traffic will not be realised.

That a substantial increase to the previously estimated surplus balance may be looked for notwithstanding is however satisfactory, especially considering the numerous items of unforeseen expenditure on urgent services that have had to be met or provided for during course of the last few months:- as for example the expenses of the Sanitation Expert; Buildings for cerebro-spinal meningitis; increased Staff for the Post Office and Public Works Departments; Machinery for the Kabete Veterinary Laboratory; extension to the Post Office Mombasa; gratuities and heavy Military expenditure, for most of which general savings were liable.

Every effort, consistent with efficiency, has been made to keep down expenditure; but this Protectorate, in its present expanding state, is, and must be, subject to sudden and urgent calls for various services.

3. The figures representing anticipated savings, £6,674, no allowance of course has been made for savings due to unexpended balances on special or extraordinary services provided for in the current year, and which will be required, in nearly all cases, to be expended in the coming financial year.

4. Appended hereto are detailed explanations of the savings and also of the excesses on the expenditure heads.
