I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Confidential despatch of the 3rd ultimo and note with great satisfaction that you approve generally of the recommendations put forward in my Confidential despatch No.90 of May 8th with the object of establishing the future administration of the Northern Frontier District, Tanaland and Jubaland on a sound basis.

2. I have consulted the Acting Chief
Secretary, the Acting Treasurer and the military
rauthorities as to the measures which can be
taken forthwith to give effect to the various
proposals and as a result of our discussion
would make the following observations.

- 3. As regards the recruitment of the additional troops which will now be required I am advised that no adequate local sources exist from which they can be obtained and I propose therefore to awant the further information which I shall doubtless receive in due course as a result of the enquiries which you have addressed to the authorities at Adis Ababa, Aden and Berbera. In the meanwhile I have instructed the Officer Commanding the Troops to prepare indents for the necessary arms, ammunition and equipment on the lines laid down by the Inspector General, King's African Rifles, in his memorandum of the 15th April 1914.
- 4. So far as communications are concerned sums of £3,830 and £5,850 are provided in the current year's estimates for Northern Frontier District Transport and Captain Meave is organizing the necessary services required and is at present paying special attention to the Nyeri-Archer's Post-Wajheir-Loyale route.

In Jubaland the Director of Public Works
has been instructed to take immediate steps to
complete the Kismayu-Gobwen road for motor
lorry transport and to carry out a reconnaissance
for its continuation to Youte in case the Jubaland Military Detachment is to be stationed
there. This is a point on which the Inspector

General has not as yet expressed a final opinion and I should be glad if an early decision could be arrived at and communicated to me.

- 5. With reference to paragraph 5 (1) of your despatch my information respecting the class of animal most suitable for mounting the Constabulary is not as yet complete and I propose to consult Captain Barrett, who will be arriving shortly, on this point. The Consular Officer whom it is proposed to appoint in Southern Abyssinia will doubtless be able to render material assistance in obtaining the mounts required.
- officer Commanding the Troops that some 300 will be available towards the end of the year when the new armament for the King's African Rifles arrives. These according to Mr. Hope's estimate should suffice for present purposes unless it is decided that the force should be armed with magazine rifles, as proposed by Mr. Thesiger. I am personally of opinion that this might be deferred for the present but if the Inspector General considers it essential I should like to be informed as soon as possible in order.

- 7. I would recommend that Captain Barrett be placed in charge of the Constabulary and propose to instruct him immediately on his return to prepare indents for ammunition, clothing and equipment.
- 8. In connection with the Juba River
 Transport, vide paragraph 6 of your despatch,
 I am consulting the Port Officer as to the
 most suitable class of vessel and I also propose to take advantage of the Admiral's approaching visit to ask him whether he can advise me
 on the subject or depute one of his officers to
 do so. I will submit indents when I am in
 possession of the necessary information.
- 9. As regards the financial aspect of the proposed arrangements it is as yet too early to forecast with any degree of accuracy how far it will be possible to meet special expenditure from current revenue. It is not however my intention to recommend that any part of our surplus balances be trenched upon unless I find that the necessary charges cannot be entirely defrayed from revenue without decreasing expenditure imperatively required in connection with the more closely administered

administered districts, which ought not in my opinion to be made to suffer for such a purpose. You may rest assured that every effort will be made to meet all recurrent expenditure from revenue.

10. In conclusion there is one point to which I would wish to refer. The salary of £1,000 per annum for the Officer-in-Charge is a more or less tentative suggestion and should it be necessary to offer more in order to attract a suitable candidate I should not have the slightest objection.
