The only material advance of the enemy against the Railway was, as indicated to you in my telegram of September 7, successfully repulsed, and our troops are now prepared to oppose agaression from any part of the Prontier.

- 4. In order to hold up any advance which may be made from the direction of Vanga, an entrenched post has been established at a point near the Ramisi River, about halfway between Vanga and Pazi, but it is not anticipated that any demonstration in force will be made in this direction.
- 5. It has to a scentained that the rising of the Giriama trite was incited by disaffected natives, who brought news of the war with fermany and represented that the time was propirties for asserting independence. The subjection of these people is being undertaken by two companies of the K.A.B., who have my instructions to give the ansurgents a sharp lesson which will render them once for all amenable to civil immistration.
- 6. The only unsatisfactory feature of the present situation is the uncertainty as to the time of arrival of the B Force and the remainder of C Perce. I realise however that there must be reasons which

It is proposed to evacuate Vanga, to build a strong fertified post for Lieut. Dickson and a small garrison in the nearest defensible locality, to retire with all troops available to Majoreni and bring up porters &c. to that place from Gazi, to prepare all bridges between Majoreni and Gazi for destruction and prepare positions on that road; that Capt. Davies with his mer abould remain at Vanga till evacuation complete, then return to Zanzitar.
