2. I observe that in paragraph 2 of  
 Mr. Read's letter of the same date to Mr. C.S.  
 Goldman, E.P., it is stated that the demarcation  
 of native rights is proceeding as rapidly as  
 possible.

3. That statement accurately represent-  
 ed the state of affairs prior to the outbreak  
 of hostilities. Since that date however the  
 area of the proposed concession has become the  
 scene of military operations and all work in  
 connection with demarcation has been indefinite-  
 ly suspended.
