tion here points to such movements into German East
Africa having taken place.

**PARAPHRASE
TELEGRAM.**

The Secretary of State for the Colonies to all the
Governors-General and Governors of the Dominions,
Colonies and Protectorates.

(Sent 10.45 p.m. 7th August, 1914.)

To Canada only
To all

With reference to my telegram of 2nd August
His Majesty's Government have now decided that
it is very important that all enemy reservists naval
or military should be detained as prisoners of war in
order to have means of enforcing proper treatment for
British officers and men who may be captured. You
should act accordingly.

Reporting officers should be directed to telegraph
direct to Admiralty names of British or neutral
merchant ships in which enemy reservists have embarked.

TELEGRAM:

The Secretary of State for the Colonies to the
Governor-General of the Union of South Africa,

(Sent 10.45 a.m. 7th August 1914)

and to other Dominions and Colonies (except British
Honduras)

(Sent 1 p.m. 7th August 1914)

You should arrest and detain all German
Officers or reservists as prisoners of war, and you
should watch Austrian officers or reservists pending
further instructions.
