Passage Allow to married officers

Call attention to practice in East to pay the officers the £10 allow even if their wives follow them out or precede them home for their own convenience.

I spoke to you about this the other day, when CA raised the point by telephone. Several Officers have asked CA to give them the £10 for the double journey and CA have refused as it was impossible to ensure that the wife would accompany her husband on the homeward journey. The Officers then inq^d CA that the Post Genl grants the £6 allow even if the wife has preceded the husband (this is often the case).

Up 973 (para 16) is quite definite on the point "Officers... when accompanied by their wives and families to and from S.A."

I am sorry I have looked at PPT 40368/12 etc.
I have spoken again to Mr. Pincus, putting
the point mentioned above to him, and
I now think that the Officers concerned
were referring to the concession approved in
Tras/1068/12. He also explained that
in the case which caused him to raise
the point, Officers claimed the £10 given
C.A. allowing the wife's return vouchers, and
explaining that they had not claimed the
£10 in the Post (i.e. the return ticket was
taken in the Post) - The wife of a return

unless the wife is only ~~gone~~ away for
a few months in the Post. 465

C.A. refused to pay the £10 in the
cases mentioned, as they had no proof
that the money had not been already
paid in the Post.

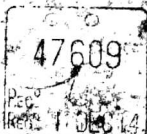
