I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 401 of the 21st of July relative to the application made by Major the Hon'ble H.C. Durie, M.A., and others for a grant of land at Hambrui, and in obedience to your instructions to furnish you with a report on the subject.

2. In May 1906, Mr. B.G. Allen, solicitor, of Nairobi, acting on behalf of Mr. D. Arnesson, Captain F.W. Barrett, Captain in the Hon'ble C. Guest and Captain the Hon'ble F. Guest, applied for a grant of 5,000 acres each in the neighbourhood of Hambrui. These applications were registered, but owing to the extremely valuable nature of the land

informed to this effect. In the meantime proofs
of means were shown and all fees paid.

3. In October 1907 the question of the
private ownership of land at the Coast was raised,
and a report on the subject was submitted by my
predecessor in his despatch No. 451 of last year.
The members of the Syndicate were at the same time
informed that while the greater portion of the
land applied for by Mr. Arnesson and Captain Barrett
was undisputed, & st of the land applied for by
the other two members of the Syndicate was claimed
by private owners, and that until the claims to
those titles had been thoroughly investigated, no
deeds could be granted. Practically, on completion
of the survey, only 1,000 acres out of the 1,000
acres applied for by Mr. Arnesson and Captain Barrett
were found to be available.

4. The Syndicate were accordingly informed
to this effect, and at the same time were asked
if they would prefer to submit an application for
the balance of 4,000 acres within another area,
or to make a fresh application altogether. They
were also offered 8,000 acres on the M. River
in lieu of the land applied for near Taborul, but
they refused.

5. A further communication was addressed to

them

them at a later date and they were informed that a lease could be granted for 2,000 acres, if they so desired, whilst a fresh application for the balance of 6,000 acres to make up the original total of 8,000 acres could be submitted when the question of native claims was finally settled.

6. This offer was likewise declined but Mr. Allen replied that Mr. Arneson was willing to withdraw his application, if he might substitute therefor another for 4,000 acres on the Nandi Escarpment. The Land Officer was unable to entertain this application and informed Mr. Allen that Mr. Arneson would have to apply for land in Nandi in the usual manner, and would be treated on the same terms as an ordinary applicant.

7. The last communication from Mr. Allen, written 1 February 1911, shows that Mr. Arneson will withdraw his application for land at the Coast when other land is granted to him, and that the other members of the syndicate are willing to await the results of the investigation of Coast Title, in the hopes of obtaining the land to which they are entitled.
