Sir:-

With reference to your letter No. 6060 of the 17th. instant respecting the operations against the Marehan tribe, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith copy of a telegram which has been sent to His Majesty's Agent at Cairo.

In view of the serious situation on the frontier and of the possibility that the trouble may spread Sir E. Grey is not without some anxiety as to the present position of Mr. Thesiger, who is on his way from Adis Ababa to Nairobi. Mr. Thesiger expected to reach Moyale about the 6th. instant, but Sir E. Grey is not aware whether he has yet arrived, and he would therefore suggest if Mr. Secretary Harcourt has no objection that a telegram should be addressed to the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate asking whether he reached
