

Your Excellency,

I have the honour to inform you that in consequence of the attitude of the Abyssinian Government in refusing to consider the rectification of the Abyssinian-Egyptian frontier as suggested by the British Government as the best and only solution to end the state of lawlessness which has existed on that frontier for some time, and so to remove the source of danger which has thus sprung up to injure the good feeling and great friendship which has always existed between Great Britain and Abyssinia, I have been instructed by my Government to make this claim for One hundred and fifty thousand dollars as compensation for the killing of Captain Aylmer and the wounding of Lieutenant Jones, which have occurred as a result of such lawlessness.

I shall be glad to receive an answer to this claim from your Government at their earliest convenience.

I hope that you are now thoroughly recovered in health.
