I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to inform you that a discussion has for some time been proceeding with the Italian Government as to the interpretation of the Tripartits Agreement of 1906 with regard to Abyssinia, in the event of the eventual breakup of that country. The discussion has hitherto been confined to the question of the future ownership of the Lake Tsana district and the control of the Abyssinian affquents of the Mile, but it will be seen from the despatch from His 'ajesty's Amrassador at Rome, copy of which is enclosed herewith, that the Italian Colonial Minister has suggested that the division of the Italian and British spheres in the south of Abyssinia should also be discussed.

Sir E. Grey is consulting His Majesty's Agent at Cairo with regard to the most advantageous boundary for the Sudan Hinterland, and he would be glad to receive Mr.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 36 of the 4th ultimo enclosing two memoranda dealing with the question of Lake Tsana. I had, pending the receipt of a reply to my despatch No. 11 Africa of the 22nd of December last, abstained from seeing Signor Agness again. But I had at our first meeting suggested that he should let me see the reports from Signor Pansa of conversations with Lord Lansdowne to which he had referred, in support of the contention that a claim on our part to the eventual territorial possession of Lake Tsana, in the event of a a break-up of the Abyssinian Empire, had surprised the Italian Covernment. To-day I remained him that he had not yet shown me any such documents and asked him 11 he had prepared any papers for me. Signor Agnesa is now at the Ministry of the Colonies. He said that these documents were at the Ministry of Foreign

Affairs, and he had to obtain the Minister's authorization.

authorisation. He would do so, and he gaite agreed that it would best serve our purpose to show one another without reserve all the evidence on which our respective standpoints were based. In the meantime we did not carry the discussion further, but Signor Agness observed that he thought, when we were dealing with this particular matter, it might be of advantage to examine the whole question of an eventual definition of apheres not only in the neighbourhood of Lake Tsana but to the south of Abyssinia also.

This suggestion of his prompts me to invite your attention once more to Lord Kitchener's despatch No. 18 Africa of May 29th, 1913, copy of which was forwarded to me in your despatch No. 22 Africa of December 5th last, for my guidance. A glance at the map which accompanied Lord Kitchener's despatch shows that in addition to the large area of what is now Abyseinia tewards the west and the Nile basin, which he has marked out as the Hinterland of the Anglo-Egyptian Soudan, a still larger area is carmarked as the Hinterland of British East Africa, and, while a marrow strip is described as the "Italian right of way", all iges of

territorial

territorial connection between Erythrea and Italian Somaliland is dismissed, the Italian Hinterland in the south being restricted to the upper reaches of the Weble Shebeli and the country of the Ogaden Somalis.

I do not know how far the views here put forward by Lord Kitchener regarding a practical partition of Abyssinia, should such a process become necessary. would be endorsed by your Department and the Colonial Office, but the fact that I have been instructed to bear his views in mind might point in that direction. I do not feel at present that it would be very opportune for me to let it be suspected here that such a large portion of Abyseinia was regarded as being in our reversionary sphere. There is at present a chauvinist tendency in this country which leads public opinion to look upon nearly the whole of Abyssinia as an area of Italian irredentian, and the subject must evidently be approached with caution. In any case, were it for a moment supposed that we contemplated converting into a more privilege of right of way across eventual British territory, our engagement, for such it is held to be, to co-operate in the realisation of the Italian

aim of territorial continuity between Erythrea and Italian Somaliland, I have no doubt whatever that a storm of the first magnitude would immediately be raised.

I may mention in conclusion that I have a note of Sir John Harrington's to the effect that, in his opinion, the territory most essential to secure, from the point of view of the Anglo-Egyptian Soudan, was that to the west of the Didessa River which joins the Blue Nile above Fazokel, and of a line from its head-waters to those of the River Orno or Gibr following the course of the latter to Lake Rudolph. This is of course only a small portion of the area which Lord Kitchener has marked as Hinterland of the Soudan. There would I am sure be no difficulty with the Italians as regards this particular area.
