



MISSION OFFICE.

July 7th, 1914.

Your Excellency:-

With reference to my Note of the 2nd instant I have the honour to state that His Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies has received a telegram from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate reporting that the prisoner now under arrest at Lomasa has not as yet admitted his identity as a German. He is being represented by a pleader in all the proceedings and his probable attitude will be that he is not the person wanted.

In these circumstances the Governor is of opinion that if the case is to be successful it is imperative that no telegram should be sent to identify the prisoner.
