SIRDAR has learnt from Uganda that in event of cables being cut near Zanzibar Uganda and East Africa messages would pass over Sudan line, where, however, there is break between Nimule and Rejef. Sirdar estimates cost of bridging gap at £ E. 7,000, but is unable to find funds in present financial situation.

As matter is one of Imperial interest His Majesty's Government may perhaps be prepared to provide necessary sum.
