Some menthe age Dr. Adalbert Shuck, a officer of Austria, commissioned to obtain certain collections, casts of natives, photographs, etc., etc., for the United States National Museum and for exhibition at the Ban Diego, California, Exposition to be held in 1915. A letter has just been received from Dr. Shuck; under date of September 9, informing the Institution that he had about completed this commission when, shortly after the news of the breaking out of the war between Austria-Hungary and Great Britain, he was arrested and after being detained for some days at Hairobi, British East Africa, was allowed to leave the country. He states that he was, however , unable to arrange for the forwarding of his camp equipment and collections which were left in a stere on s form near Kyambu (Tinganga Farm, Kyamba, e/s Kr. B. I. Barton). He also left two large trunks at the Norfelk Hetel, Bairebi. This material is urgently needed for use in the preparation of the exhibits for the abeve-mentioned expecition. I beg leave, therefore, to bring the matter to your attention and to ask that you will have the goodness, if possible, to arrange for permission for its shipment to this institutfin.

In the hope that it may be practicable to allow this material to be forwarded, I venture to enclose a letter addressed to.

Newland, Tarlton & Co. Nairobi, directing them to obtain the material in question and to attend to its forwarding at the expense of this Institution.

I am in great distress concerning my husband, who I believe is a prisoner in German East Africa, but unfortunately I am unable to find this out. I small be very grateful if you are able to give me any information; the war Office cannot.

My husband, James Scott Brown was one of the mem-

ders of the Cape to Cairo Motor Expedition and was returning home through Garman East Africa when the war broke out, and was nearing Tabera when he last wrote a letter dated August 2nd. He sail he was meeting trouble with Garmans but had booked through to Daresalaam. I have no further news, and my letters are returned from maresalaam undeliverable, so that I am quite unable to find out anything, or when he is likely to be released if a prisoner. I have in great distress financially having means. I understand I could get assistance if I could prove my husband it a prisoner, but of this I am not

quite sure.

The Cape to Cairo members were received by the King himself before they left England last July twelve-month. The car was christened by Princess Louise. The leader Captain Kelsey dies of leopard wounds in Africa which brought the tour to an end.

Trusting you will favour me with a raply.
