

Sir:-

With reference to your letter, 42289/14, of the 3rd instant regarding operations in East Africa, I am directed by Secretary Sir E. Grey to transmit to you herewith, for the information of Mr. Secretary Harcourt, a copy of a telegram sent to His Majesty's Minister at Havre on the 6th instant, and a copy of a despatch from Sir R. Villiers dated the 7th instant.

I am to enquire what reply Mr. Harcourt would suggest should be returned to the Belgian Government, especially in view of the telegrams from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate enclosed in your letter of the 8th instant, No. 43240/14 Secret.

SIR,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your secret telegram No. 159, of yesterday's date. In accordance with your instruction I have told the Minister for Foreign Affairs that I was authorized to state for the very confidential information of the Belgian Government that the British forces are at present so disposed in British East Africa as to render it very unlikely that the Germans will make any attack of a serious character upon the Belgian Congo. On this account therefore the Belgian Government need not be seriously anxious.

Directly after my communication was made I received from M. Devignon the note of which I enclose a copy. The Minister for the Colonies, as you will perceive, points out the danger which would arise for the Belgian Congo should the Germans

Germans be relieved of all apprehension of pressure on the part of the British Colonial forces, and he asks that a military demonstration at least should be made on the German West African frontier.

If your telegram refers to all the British Colonies adjacent to the Belgian Congo a reply is furnished to M. Devignon's note, but no doubt the Belgian Government would be able to have precise information on this point.

Monsieur le Ministre:-

Par Sa note verbale du 3 octobre dernie, Votre Excellence a bien voulu me faire savoir qu'il n'entrait pas dans les intentions du Gouvernement anglais de prendre l'offensive contre l'Afrique Occidentale allemande soit du Nyassaland, soit de l'Ugande, soit de la Rhodésie.
