2. With regard to the previous correspondence on this subject, I am to refer to the letters from this Department of 5th October, 1st November, 3rd November and 17th November.

3. Mr. Harcourt would be glad if the Army Council would state how far the reply to the Belgian Government proposed in the letter from this Department to the Foreign Office of November 16th should be modified in view of Sir E. Grey's criticisms. It would appear to him that the question depends not on the opinion of the General Officer Commanding in the East Africa Protectorate, but on the decision (which now rests with the Army Council) as to what steps are to be decided upon in this country for future operations against German East Africa.


