The Secretary, Army Council, presents his compliments to the Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and encloses a copy of a telegram which has been transmitted to him by the India Office.

The Secretary, Army Council, desires to state that the services of Mr. King, Consul of Der es Salaam, may possibly be again required by General Aitken. It is therefore suggested that he should be attached to the Civil Administration of British East Africa, so as to be easily available. It is understood that instructions will be given to Mr. King by the Foreign Office.
