With reference to your letter of the 10th instant (48381/1914) transmitting copy of a despatch from the Governor of the East Africa Protectorate on the subject of the removal to this country under the Colonial Prisoners Removal Act of James Storie Anderson, who has been sentenced to 2½ years' rigorous imprisonment for Cheating under Section 420 Indian Penal Code, I am directed by the Secretary of State for the Home Department to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that on the understanding that all expenditure will, in accordance with the usual practice, be defrayed from Colonial funds, he assents to the removal of the prisoner to England, and will make arrangements for the reception of the prisoner in any English Prison on learning when and where he may be expected to land.

NOW I DO HEREBY in pursuance of the Colonial Prisoners' Removal Act, 1884, with the concurrence of the Government of the said Protectorate order that the said James Storie Anderson be removed to the United Kingdom there to undergo the residue of his said sentence (with such variations of the conditions thereof as are or shall be provided by any regulations in force for the time being under the said Act) in accordance with the said Act.
