With reference to your letters of the 1st instant,  
No. 214 E.A., and 3rd of May, No. 12032/1910, and previous  
correspondence, concerning the vacancies for three Male  
Postal Clerks and Telegraphists in British East Africa and  
Uganda, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information  
of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that out of the  
numerous candidates who, as stated in the letter from this  
Office of the 13th of October last, No. 257862/09, offered  
themselves for the two last similar vacant appointments, a  
considerable number possess the necessary qualifications, and  
the Postmaster General has therefore recognized the claims  
of the candidates not selected in that instance.

The most suitable candidates appear to be Messrs. M. Little  
H.M. Giddy, and A. Davies, Sorting Clerks and Telegraphists  
in Provincial Offices, aged respectively 24, 24 and 23. They  
are good telegraphists and efficient in postal duties. All  
of them have good health; but, in case one of them should not  
be passed by the Medical Adviser to the Colonial Office or  
for any other reason should fail to take up the appointment,  
Mr. Samuel suggests Mr. V. Sutcliffe, provincial Sorting  
Clerk and Telegraphist, aged 25, as the officer whom he would  
next select. Each of the officers mentioned will be
